1. ENEMY SITUATION AT END OF PERIOD.

See sketch map attached as Annex 1.

2. ENEMY OPERATIONS DURING THE PERIOD.

a. On 26 March, strong rearguard units of the 130th Panzer Lehr Division and of the 111th Panzer Grenadic Regiment of the 11th Panzer Division were driven from the Hawkenberg - EITORF - STERZENBACH area. The large concentrations of tanks and vehicles noted on 25 March along the BULGENAUEL EITORF road were reported by aerial reconnaissance in the early part of the day in the area east of EITORF. Further reports from the same source indicated that the enemy units were crossing the Halfr bridge and moving along the main road to the north. Our advance, particularly on the central portion of the Division front, was stubbornly contested by enemy reargualds in order to give these tanks and vehicles a chance to make their escape north of the river. Enemy artillery, mortar and rocket here was less intense during the period than on any day since the Division began its operations in the bridgehead area; less than 2,000 rounds were roceived during the period. 309 prisoners were taken and six tanks were destroyed in the day's fighting, one self-propelled gun and two 150mm towed howitzers were captured.

b. On the Division left our units attacked shortly after the start of the period and by mid-day had seized the towns of ADSCHEID, HANKEN HERG and SUCHTERCHEID. Enemy resistance was of moderate intensity but was not in any great strength, and was rapidly o'enome. The attack towards HITORF, which also began shortly frer the start of the period, met greater resistance. At 04004 hours, shortly after our units succeeded in taking RIEDBAN and were moving on towards JUNCKENRALH, they were counterstacked by three tanks and an estimated 100 infantry. By 06004 hours, the enemy counterattack had been repulsed and our units had pushed on to the high ground just to the southwest of HITORF. The enemy stubbornly held on to his positions in the HITCRF area throughout the day, supplementing his direct fire by artillery and rocket fire from north of the SIEG. After dark, our units

continued the attack and at the close of the period were completing their mopping up of the town. The vigor of the enemy's defense in this area during the early part of the period is believed to have resulted from the necessity to give the major tank and vehicular elements of Panzer Lehr Division the necessary time to withdraw to the east and north. On the Division right, our units made gains of up to 6,000 yards. Enemy resistance was light to moderate until our units pushed into STERZENEACH. At this point they ran into a short but brisk fire fight, at the close of the period the enemy had been cleared from the high ground overlooking the flat ground of the valley of the SIAC, and it is not believed at this time that there is any organized enemy unit in this area, although a few scattered stragglers may still remain. Our units, pushing east through the STAATS FORST STEPENGERINGE, seized Hill 588 and trail junctions to the south and southwest, without encountering any organized enemy units. Some enemy artillery fire, however, was received.

- c. An estimated 1,700 rounds of artillery, morter and rocket fire were received during the period. This total includes 800 rounds of rocket fire and 200 rounds of mortar lire. Enemy fire was heaviest on our units attacking EITOPP, alwouth both our left and right flank units were also hit. Income artillery fire during the day was generally confined to forward areas coming from the north. No reports were received of any large scale interdictory and harassing fire in tear areas, as was received during 25 March.
 - d. No enemy aircraft were reported over the Division area during 26 March.
- e. Reports received during the period indicate that the 150th Panzer Lehr Division and elements of the 11th Panzer Division on the Division front have largely been disengaged, the major bulk of Panzer Lehr Division withdrawing north of the SIEG River, and the elements of the 11th Panzer Division retiring to the area north and northest of ALTENKIRCHEN. The future employment of Panzer Lehr Division is at present a matter only for conjecture. It is conceivable that this division may cross the SIEG further east and once again encounter the Division.

3. MISC TLI MEOUS.

a. Three hundred and nine prisoners were taken during the period. For details of prisoners processed through the Division Cage to 261800A March, see attached Consolidated Interrogation leport.

b. Maximum temperature for 26 March was 57, minimum 50.

c. Weather forecast for period 261800A to 271800A March: Precipitation: scattered showers late afternoon 27 March. Visibility: 5 - 7 miles until end of period. Temperature: minimum 43, maximum 62. Flying conditions: good from dawn 27 March until 1400A hours, then moderate.

4. ENEMY CAPABILITIES.

It is believed that there will be no enemy resistance encountered during 27 March strong enough to stop the movement of one of our reinforced battalions. It is possible that element of panzer Lehr Division and of the 11th Panzer Division with a strength somewhat less than that of a regimental combat seam may be encountered in the Division's continuing attack to the northeast.

Evidence that the Panzer LEHR Division has pulled out across the SIEG River came from a prisoner who was driving a one-ian convoy down the road on his way to OBEREIP before he ran afoul of one of our tanks. He had been up to HEIDE, on the other side of the river and about four kilometers northeast of SIEGEURG, to pick up an 88mm gun. On his way back he was tooling down the road in his 6-ten truck, towing the 88mm and a trailer when he arrived

at MUCH on the main road about 2330 last night. There he was stopped by an MP until a high-priority convoy heading north could clear the road. The prisoner said he saw horse-drawn vehicles and guns, tracked vehicles, tanks and trucks in great numbers going past. It was not until nearly 0300 that he could get on his way again. He crossed the river at EITORF, and observed nore big artillery pieces heading north. The MP at the bridge gave him directions for OBEREIP and the prisoner took off again. Just outside MUHLEIP his consternation was acute when suddenly an unobserved tank put a round smack into his noter. The prisoner and his assistant driver ducked behind their sent into an armored compartment, but with the second round they scampered out, considerably the worse for wear, and junced into a ditch, where they were picked up. The assistant driver was suffering from concussion and unable to talk, but the driver said he had no idea our troops had noved into MUHLEIP and OBEREIP in his absence, and still less that the road into the town would be covered by a tank.

- 2. The large bag of prisoners from the 90% Infantry Reginent represented almost the entire personnal of Battlegroup ABEL, or the 1st Battalion, 943d. Major ABEL, Co of the outfit, was among the PWs captured and explained what had happened. He said the 941st and 943d Regiments were holding a sector along the north bank of the SIEC from slightly est of HENNEF to the bridge at BOURAUE (7842). The positions are tacked up by the 353d Artillery Regiment, which is firing into the 1st Division sector. The night before last the major was ordered to take his battalion across the river and recapture honder. He got to BLANKENBERG without incident and continued on to DONDORF, reaching the outskirts of the town without apposition except some casual artillery fire. Suddenly he began to suspect that he had been sucked into a trap. At the cage he said he felt sure that our troops had seen him and his battalian coming, allowing him to proceed down a draw until he was well surrounded. Then the bottom fell out of his operation, and or the 200 men who had started on the counter-ctack, 158 were captured. If any got away, they were few; the rest were probably assulties of our artillery fire. The major, who was one of the survivors of the 942d Regiment's ill-advised "special mission" to relieve BASTOGNE, had just been promoted from captain a few days ago. At the cage he was still wearing captain's insignic on his overcoat, and he asked the interrogator if he could get some major's shoulder bars. He presumed the Division has appured many a major and probably had a supply of major's pathies. He would be glad to pay any ressonable price... He went to the rear still a captain when he had his overcoat on.
- 3. The executive officer of the 1st Battalion, 111th Panzer condier Regiment also showed up. Until three months ago he had been an SOS officer, but the urgent draft of a ble-bodied men cleaned him out and sent him to the 11th Panzer Division Combat School.

in the vicinity of ALTENKIRCHEN. While there several days ago he heard all sorts of rumors and gossip about the enemy's big plans for the bridgehead. He said that it was generally realized that the bridgehead could not be eliminated entirely with the forces on hand. What could be done, however, would be to attack with two armored divisions, criss-crossing the northern sector of the bridgehead (which the enemy considered the most dangerous) and sealing off the advance which the enemy expected in that area. The 11th Fanzer Division would attack from the northwest and the 130th Panzer LEHR Division would attack from the northeast to the southwest. This plan seemed about to come off when his battalion was pulled out of its area and hovel to. His outfit managed to retake HOVE and SCHEUREN briefly, but was pushed out again almost innediately under intense artillary fire. That ended the major counter-offensive and the battalion was given holding missions and ordered to reorganize. The prisoner said the basic plan was to make UCKERATH the keystone of the detion, with Panzer LEHR holding the north and 11th Panzer Division the south; both units were to garrison the town strongly.

- 4. That the 11th Panzer Division managed to love into its positions before the counter-offensive broke lown was indicated by prisoners from the 110th Panzer Grenadier Regiment who were held more or less in reserve to the south of the 111th Regiment. They arrived in the sector from assembly points in NEUSTADT on 23 March in three companies. These companies comprised the 1st Battalion; they said there is no 2d Battalion unless one has been organized from stragglers and remaints since they left the regimental area.
- 5. Evidently the replacement system for enemy units in the north is still functioning. Today's arrival was the 3731 March Battalion of 200 men which had come from WESTPHALIA as replacements for the 62d Volksgrendier Division. The prisoners were all from Battlegroup HINGIANN, of 60 men. Yesterday the 5th Army Weapons School was chewed up in the fighting in GEISBACH; with their failure to take and hold the town, Battlegroup FINNEMANN was ordered into action, with the same result but less determination than the capons school men.
 - 6. Another group identified in the north was the 553d Replacement Fettalion, or Battlegroup SCHMIDT. At least it was presumed to be the 353d Replacement Battalion; the men were about the most confused, lost and flabbergasted PWs to arrive in the cage in several waks. Many had no paybooks, others had never been sworn into the army and still others had been in the army only three days before commitment. Not one of the 33 men knew what his outfit was, where he had been going or what he had been doing.
 - 7. The fourth artillery regiment to be identified in four lays showed up with prisoners from the 119th Regiment, of the 11th Panzer Division. The regiment has three battalions, two of 105mms

(total of 20 guns) and one of 150mms (eight guns). The regiment was in position in the woods near KIRCHEIB and, being hersedrawn, the prisoners thought that most of it had managed to get away from our advance.

- 8. A second viewing of the 130th Panzer Regiment (this time from a battalion clork) indicates that the 2d Battalion of the regiment arrived here with 14 tanks and 700 men divided into three combat teams. The prisoner's combat team was attached to the 901st Regiment. Yesterday aftermoon the entire outfit was ordered to pull out. Gasoline was to be furnished by a truck at a rendezvous point at 800403. Whether the truck got there or not the present did not know; he was captured before the truck was due to arrive at 0400 today.
- 9. Two drivers from the 654th GHQ Anti-Tank Battalion said that the outfit was also known as Battlegroup NOAK, which was encountered by the 1st Division previously in the britychead fighting. The battalion is, or was, entirely equipped with 88mm Jagdpanthers the latest wrinkle in enemy anti-tak was pons. During the battalion's engagement, 16 of the Jagdpanthers were laid up for one reason or another. Some were destroyed, but more were eliminated with motor trouble and sent back to the repair company (where there were a total of 15 TDs being worked on according to the prisoner) and can be expected back in notion soon. As with all enemy vehicles at the moment, the most serious operational problem was lack of gasoline. Last eight the battalion was ordered to pull north of HASSELBACH (8654), and at the same time the repair company was ordered to withdraw 80 kilometers into the dubious safety of the Greater German Reich.
